

# STUDENT DROP OFF AND PICK-UP

Please do not park behind the busses on Thompson Street between Sec-



ond Avenue and Central Avenue. There is a parking bylaw in effect during school hours. Signs are posted in this area. Individuals are often walking or running between the busses or around the busses to get to vehicles parked directly behind the busses on Thompson Street. There is moving traffic on the street directly behind the busses and we are concerned that someone may be



struck by a vehicle while crossing the street. No one should walk between the busses as this creates a safety issue. Thank-you for your anticipated co-operation and willingness to work together to create a safe environment for the students in our school.

### SCHOOL ARRIVAL TIME

All students should arrive at school no earlier than 8:45 a.m. unless they are attending a school related activity. Students in Grades 1 to 6 will be expected to remain on the playground until the bell rings. Playground supervision begins at 8:45 a.m. As the weather gets cooler, we ask that students dress appropriately. All students in Grades K to 6 are expected to go outside for recesses and at noon hour. If the weather is inclement (ie. raining or extremely cold) students will be kept inside.

If students or parents have concerns or questions about an issue at school, please follow this communication process:


The classroom teacher is to be the first person to hear and address any concerns from a student or parent.

If the issue cannot be resolved with the teacher, the principal is to be contacted.

If the matter remains unresolved, the parent may request a meeting with the Director or

designate (Superintendent).

The parent may also request a hearing with the Board of Education to further appeal the decision.
