Admin message:

We are down to a two month sprint to finish the school year! It was so great to see and meet with some families on March 31st both virtually and face to face. We are hoping to have more opportunities this school year and next to have families in and around the school again.

DCS will keep our quarter system for the 2022/23 school year that was used this school year. PSSD sent a survey to parents and students in January to collect data on how this type of school schedule was going. According to our students, 68% saw the quarter system as positive, while 5% saw it as negative and 27% were neutral. 72% of parent responses were positive regarding the quarter system, 16% saw it as negative and 12% were neutral. Because of these numbers we have made the decision to keep the quarter system for 2022/23.



School Goals 2021-2022

At our April 4 Professional Development day, we took time to reflect on the school goals we had set. We looked at why we had chosen the goals we did, what data and impact we felt that each had, and assessed our overall progress on the goal. These were the summary statements that we gathered for each.

Goal 1: Outcome Based Assessment

This was set as one of our goals because it ties assessment directly to outcomes and helps us keep our teaching focused on what matters. We are noticing that students are buying in and are engaged in their school work. We can more easily meet each student where they are at, while creating continuity between teachers, schools, students, and parents.

Goal 2: Mental Health and Emotional Regulation

The mental health and wellness goal was chosen because more education and awareness is needed by all of us (students, staff, community) due to COVID, the world, and life in general. We incorporated mental health and emotional regulation learning into Rebel Time, into our classrooms, and we listened to students in our different survey work. We are talking about it in many spaces, have visual cues in halls and classrooms, and know this is an area we want/need more training in. We have seen progress in ourselves and our staff in open discussions with students, and in their openness in identifying their needs and who to see for help. Thanks to Mrs. Peters and the Mental Health Literacy Team for organizing a February Staff Wellness Month!



Goal 3: Reconciliation

We chose a reconciliation goal because we need to do our part to inspire change in our community, as this has not been a focus in the past. Our work towards this goal includes meeting kids where they are at, incorporating Truth and Reconciliation into staff meetings, beginning an Indigenous Group, observing Orange Shirt Day, Walk for Wenjack, etc. as well as classroom discussions, and recently a Kairos Blanket Exercise facilitated by Amanda Nelson, Strategic Facilitator for Indigenous Partnerships and Perspectives in PSSD. Our work is ongoing, and the learning and conversations will continue.

Today, our NS30 class participated in a Blanket Exercise, the first time it's ever been done in our school. In their reflections, it's obvious it had an enormous impact on Ss. A huge THANK YOU to Amanda Nelson for facilitating! Maarsii!! @amandanilssen4 #mpscpssd #reconciliation




