

Thank you to all the students, staff and community who made October such a great month to be a part of LAS!



As a result of the Communication Survey that went out in last month's newsletter, we will be making a few changes at school. Here's the results:




- For general information we will send out emails (to those on the newsletter distribution list).

But how do I know how my child is doing?

- Feedback open conversation with teachers is key. Also, you can expect informative feedback on assignments and Progress Reports rather than just a number
- Criteria Based Grading The indicators act as criteria for achieving the outcome (which is assessed). You can expect to see specific criteria attached to assignments in the form of expectations or rubrics.

It's true, criterion based grading and the coding system will be unfamiliar to parents to begin with, but these changes have been made to support student learning and achievement. The key to making these changes make sense is to be informed and ask questions whenever necessary. We look forward to going on this journey together!

Yann Martel and Alice Kuipers

We were fortunate enough to have two fabulous authors come and visit our school on October 24th to talk to the students. Yann Martel, author of <u>Life of Pi</u>, talked to the middle year and senior students about his writing process, and how his book got made into an academy award winning movie. Alice Kuipers came and read to students from two books that are in the process of being published. With the Kindergarten students she read from her book about a young girl who wants to be an author, Violet, and her brother Victor who is more interested in playing with worms. She was able to share the illustrator's pages with us. Kids enjoyed making book worms. Alice Kuipers read from her soon to be published book "Polly Diamond: Writer Fabulosa" to the grade 3 and 4 classes. Dear Parents/Guardians

As the flu season is upon us, please help us to ensure student health by following these basic precautions for the protection of your own child and others:

- 1. Practice GermSmart behaviours with your children at home. Please remind students about proper hand washing procedures and the proper way to cough (into the elbow).
- 2. Please review the following information on Influenza.
- 3. If your child is demonstrating flu-like symptoms or respiratory illness, please:
 - Keep students at home.
 - Take students into the doctor.
 - Call the absence into the office. To help the office keep track of illnesses, please also let us know what your child is home sick with.

We thank you for your cooperation with helping us keep LAS as illness free as possible.

Influenza for The General Public

What is influenza?

- An infection caused by influenza viruses.
- There are several different types of influenza viruses.

How does a person get influenza?

- The virus is spread:
 - directly from person to person through coughing and sneezing
 - Indirectly from touching contaminated surfaces and objects, and then touching the eyes/nose/mouth.
- The virus can survive on some surfaces for up to 48 hours.

What are the signs and symptoms?

- Symptoms develop 1 to 3 days after a person has become infected.
- Influenza has a sudden onset with fever, headache, muscle aches, joint pain, sore throat, tiredness and cough.

- Fever may not be prominent in children or the elderly,
- Nausea, vomiting and diarrhea are not common in adults but may occur in children.
- Influenza is more severe than the common cold (see table below).
- In severe cases, influenza may result in pneumonia, bronchitis, kidney or heart failure.
- Most symptoms resolve in 5 to 7 days, but cough and fatigue can last 2 weeks or more.

What is Pandemic Influenza?

- Pandemic Influenza is a worldwide outbreak of Influenza.
- It is caused by a new type of virus which occurs every 10 to 30 years. Because the virus is completely new, the population has little or no immunity to it. This means that more people will develop the illness than in non-pandemic years.

Public Health Services

How is influenza treated?

- Get plenty of rest and drink lots of fluids.
- Acetaminophen (Tylenol) or Ibuprofen (Advil) helps to lessen fever, aches and pains. A.S.A. (Aspirin) should not be given to children, teenagers or young adults to possibility of developing Reye's Syndrome (a very serious neurological disease).
- Gargle with a glass of warm water containing ½ teaspoon of salt to ease a sore throat. Lozenges and sugarless hard candy are also effective.
- Do not smoke or drink alcohol smoking irritates the airways and alcohol dries the tissues which makes them more susceptible to other infections.
- Prescription medication(s) may be prescribed by your doctor.

How is influenza prevented?

- Influenza immunization is the best method of prevention.
- Avoid crowded places.
- Cough or sneeze into your arm or sleeve instead of your hands.
- Wash hands frequently with soap & water.
- Use hand sanitizers with at least 60% alcohol when soap & water are not available.
- Keep hands away from your face.
- Stay home if you become sick.
- Do not visit people who have the flu, if you can avoid it.

What if my child or I have symptoms?

- Do not attend daycare, school, place of work, social gathering places (eg: coffee shop) or volunteer activities while symptoms are present.
- If you are a healthcare worker, do not attend work for 5 days after onset of symptoms, unless otherwise directed by

Occupational Health & Safety at your place of work.

When should I call my doctor?

- Call your doctor if any of the following symptoms develop:
 - chest pains or pressure
 - shortness of breath while resting
 - difficult or painful breathing
 - coughing up bloody sputum
 - wheezing
 - a fever greater than 39° C that lasts more than 4 days or if it is getting worse
 - you start to feel better and suddenly get a fever over 39° C and start to feel sick again
 - drowsiness, disorientation or confusion
 - extreme pain in your ear.
- For children, call the doctor if the child:
 - has a heart or lung disease or any chronic illness which requires regular medical care
 - has a disease or is taking drugs or treatments that affect the immune system
 - has trouble breathing
 - is less than 6 months old and has a temperature over 38.5°C
 - is irritable and cannot be calmed down
 - is listless and doesn't play with toys
 - drinks little fluid and does not urinate at least every 6 hours when awake
 - has severe vomiting or diarrhea.
 - symptoms improve and suddenly get worse,
- For children, call 911 if the child:
 - has severe trouble breathing
 - has blue lips
 - is limp or unable to move
 - has a stiff neck
 - seems confused
 - has a seizure.

About 2.5 million Canadians report having a food allergy. While only eight foods (milk, egg, peanut, tree nuts, fish, shellfish, wheat and soy) account for approximately 90 percent of all food-allergic reactions, a person can be allergic to virtually any food.

At Lord Asquith School we are Allergy Aware. We have several students that have life-threatening allergies to peanuts and tree nuts. Please do not send anything to school that has peanuts and tree nuts in it.




