

# STEELERS SHOWCASE



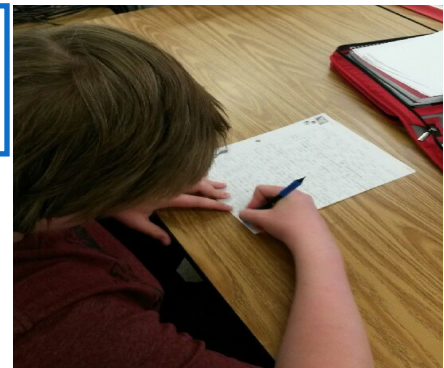
Welcome to this month's edition of the Steelers Showcase! April's version displays various written assignments completed by the grade 9 students.

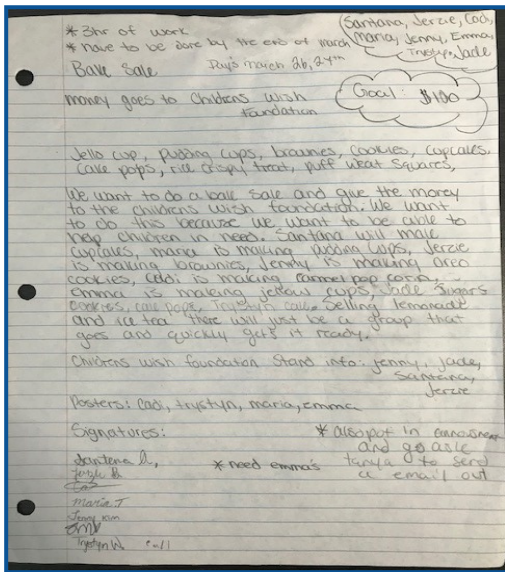

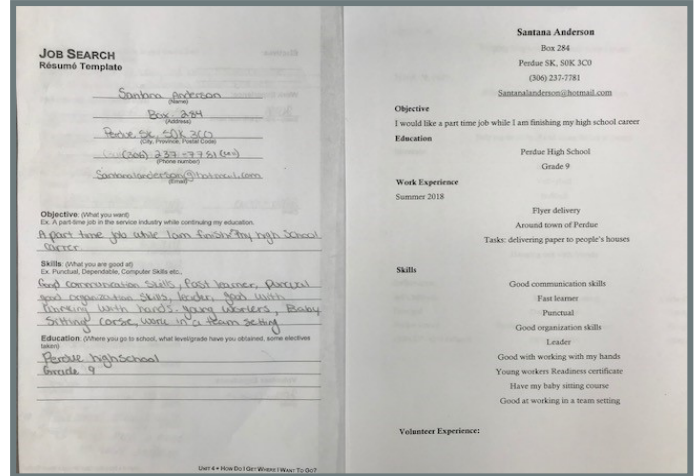

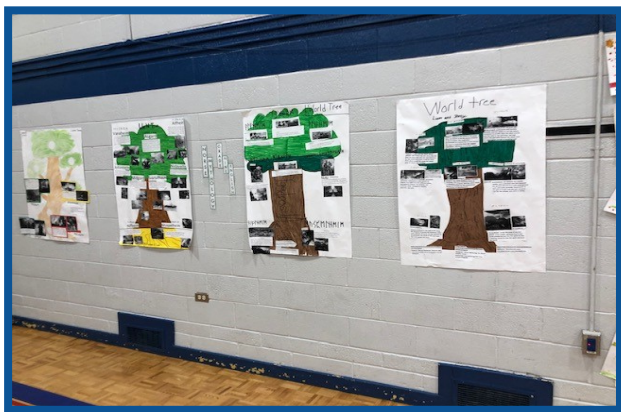
