Now we're anticipating the Christmas concert as we practice acting out the Christmas Story for our first school performance!












Kindergarten Creates!

Riding and Reading

Travel is just the thing to get young minds moving. Turn travel time during a family trip into a great bonding and learning adventure with activities that build language for literacy and boost kids' brain development. Don't forget to pack your imagination!

What to bring

Music. Before your trip, take time to make a sing-along playlist of family favorites. (Remember to bring whatever you need to connect your mobile device to the car stereo and keep it charged.) On the road, get kids listening by asking them to keep an ear out for certain words or sounds and clapping when they hear them. Then get them singing along!

With the car stereo off, try teaching each other classic kids' songs, folk songs, Sesame Street and Disney tunes, the national anthem, or Broadway hits. You'll find lyrics online or you can show kids how they can make their own music by inventing new verses to songs like "If You're Happy and You Know It."

Books. Invest some time before your trip in choosing some audio books the whole family can listen to. Search for recommendations in Reading Rockets list of Favorite Audio Books (http://www.readingrockets.org/articles/books/audiobooks) or ask your librarian for ideas. Your public library may have books on CD that you can borrow or lend electronic audio books you can download to your device. Choose audio books that will stimulate discussion, like classics or books on topics of interest to everyone in your family.

Look too for audio books of stories you've shared with your child, and plan to talk about how the reader's interpretation is similar or different from yours, especially if the audio book reader is the author! If you are listening to picture books, bring along a copy so kids can look at the illustrations while listening.

Let kids pack some favorite titles to look at, to read to you, or have read aloud to them while you're on the road. And bring along some new books, too. A new release by a favorite author or a new book in a beloved series will add excitement to your trip.

Stories. Family stories, tales of road trips past, adventures of your youth stories, and stories and facts about your destination do more than pass the time on the road. As kids hear and learn from the successes, mistakes, values, and ideas in your stories, their understanding of how to have their own adventures — and their own stories — will grow.

As you share stories, give your child a chance to ask questions and offer his perspective. Storytelling is more fun if everyone gets a chance to tell a story! Try telling a memorable family story with everyone taking turns or turn family photos into family stories. Have photos on your mobile device or bring along copies of pictures and share stories about the people and the places important to your family.

Keep Your Kids Reading Over the Holidays

One of the things kids look forward to in December is the academic downtime, but there's no reason why they can't keep their minds sharp during the holidays. And, believe it or not, they can have fun while doing it. "Reading doesn't have to mean sitting at a table with a boring school book for a set amount of time each day," says Kathy Doyle Thomas, executive vice president of the bookstore chain, Half Price Books. "You can easily 'sneak' reading into daily activities." Here are her tips for sneaking learning into holidays at home:

- Have your children read holiday cards when they are received in the mail, and let them write a message in outgoing cards.
- Let children read ingredients from holiday recipes while you bake together. It's a great way for them to learn measurements and temperatures.
- Set aside time for kids to "show off" their new reading skills to visiting relatives. Children love being the focus of attention, and grandparents are usually more than willing to see their progress.
- Make special holiday readings a tradition. Find a special book for Hanukkah or Christmas, and have each member of the family read from it at the same time each year.
- Even if no books make your child's wish list, make sure you give at least one as a gift, and encourage them to read it.

Find books that focus on an interest your child has. For example if they ask for a bike, find a children's book that includes a bicycle adventure. There are books out there to suit every interest under the sun – it just takes a little browsing.



Cold and Inclement Weather

It is difficult for some of us to think about the winter weather that will soon be upon us. Especially after the unseasonal weather we experienced in October. Here is the school's plan for cold and inclement weather as stated in our handbook:

At break times and before school, all students from Kindergarten to grade 6 will go outside and play. Your child should always come to school with proper cold weather attire, regardless of the season. When the temperature with wind-chill factor falls between -27 and -29 degrees Celsius, children will be expected to spend a shorter time outside. When the wind chill factor is -30 degrees Celsius or colder, students will not be required to go outside, however they should always have sufficient outdoor clothing in the event of an emergency.

Should a student's medical condition require him/her to temporarily stay indoors, we ask the parent to notify the teacher. We would encourage you to keep your child at home if they are ill.

Severe Weather/Bus Cancellations

All Prairie Spirit School Division bus cancellations are prominently posted on the Prairie Spirit website (www.spiritsd.ca/Buses) by 7 am, each school day. Please keep in mind that you will need to refresh your computer in order to ensure you are able to see the most current updates to the website. Buses in Prairie Spirit School Division will not run if the combined temperature and wind chill factors result in a reading of -40 degrees or below at 6 am, (as reported by Environment Canada for Saskatoon at www.weatheroffice.gc.ca). Prairie Spirit School Division will post bus cancellations on its telephone hotline (306-683-2805) and Transportation webpage (spiritsd.ca/buses) after 6:00AM. Local radio stations will no longer be contacted. In stormy conditions, bus drivers will use their discretion to determine whether or not to run. Buses are not to operate if weather conditions such as freezing rain, dense fog, heavy rain or severe dust storms impair visibility or otherwise cause dangerous travel conditions.



Bus drivers are to decide whether or not to run by no later than 30 minutes before the first scheduled morning pick up, and by no later than one hour prior to the scheduled afternoon dismissal. Buses that do not run at the regular time in the morning due to weather conditions are not to run at all on that same day.

Prairie Spirit School Division Bus Rules

- Students must show respect for driver, equipment, other students and their personal space.
- Student seating will be assigned by the bus driver.
- Students must remain seated and facing forward on the bus.
- Quiet conversation with close neighbors is allowed.
- Eating or drinking on the bus is not permitted. Water will be allowed.
- Windows are to be adjusted only with permission of the bus driver. Keep head and arms inside the bus at all times.
- Student personal items and books must be placed near feet or on lap.
- The aisle must be kept clear of objects at all times.
- Students must promptly obey instructions of the driver.

If this is a charter, there must be a teacher or adult on the bus to supervise the students. It is not the charter driver's responsibility to enforce these rules. Exception would be Band and HE/IA charters.
