Cybersafety – Cyberbullying Presentation for Parents and Community

TELL THEM FROM ME

Prior to the Christmas break all of our students had an opportunity to complete the Tell Them From Me survey, which gives all Saskatchewan school students from Grades 4-12 the opportunity to provide feedback on their school experience. One of the questions that WCMS asked students reflected our ongoing literacy work and the focus we have on instilling in students the use of specific reading/ thinking strategies.

Students were asked: "Good readers use strategies to help them keep track


of thinking and understanding what they are reading and have ways to help them get 'unstuck' when they get into difficulties. Which of the following statements best describes you as a reader?"

- I ALMOST ALWAYS have strategies for monitoring my understanding when reading and helping myself when I get stuck or confused. (AAL)
- I OFTEN have strategies for monitoring my understanding when reading and helping myself when I get stuck or confused. (OFT)
- I SOMETIMES have strategies for monitoring my understanding when reading and helping myself


when I get stuck or confused. (SMT)

- I RARELY have strategies for monitoring my understanding when reading and helping myself when I get stuck or confused. (RAR)

These were the results (Note: students Grade 6 and below take one survey and students in Grade 7 and higher take a different survey so the results are reported separately).

We feel encouraged by this data and are happy to see that at the current time a majority of students in WCMS always or often feel they have strategies for monitoring their comprehension


and have ways to help them get unstuck. Support our work by asking your child about the thinking strategies they use when reading, or what they do when they get stuck or confused.


Tell your child about how you keep track of what you are reading and what you do when you get off track.

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Busing Guidelines for Martensville and Warman



Safe Transportation: A Shared Responsibility

Every school day, Prairie Spirit safely transports over 5,000 students to school on 143 bus routes, travelling 22,000 kilometres. It requires considerable cooperation and coordination to accomplish this task safely and efficiently. This pamphlet provides key information for students and parents, along with contact information for questions or concerns.

Transportation protocols and guidelines

Qualifying for Service

Students with a walking distance of more than one kilometre to the school are eligible for urban busing. The walking distance is calculated using Prairie Spirit's electronic bus mapping program.

Prairie Spirit bus transportation is provided to addresses that are primary residences of the families who request bus service. For Prairie Spirit busing purposes, primary residence is defined as "the residence where the family spends the majority of the nights per year." Information provided by the family regarding a primary residence will be accepted, unless contrary information is provided.

All urban students must obtain a Prairie Spirit bus pass and present it to the bus driver to ride a school bus in Martensville or Warman.

Transportation requests for new students or changes to a route must be made directly to the Conveyance Manager, not to the Bus Driver. Please complete the *School Bus Service Request* form (found on the Prairie Spirit [website](#)) to register new students or to change existing information for current students. Please allow seven days for processing and receipt of bus passes.

Bus drivers will not allow students without bus passes on the bus. All urban students must obtain a bus pass and present it to the bus driver to ride the bus. Bus passes are valid only for the bus indicated on the pass. Students may ride only the bus indicated on the pass. No guest passengers are allowed on buses in Martensville or Warman.

Departure and Drop Off Schedules

Urban bus stops are group stops. Bus drivers do not monitor attendance of passengers. Students are to be ready five minutes before the bus "Leave Time" as posted on the Prairie Spirit website. Bus route time schedules are based on normal driving conditions. The schedule is communicated to parents with the directive that, under normal conditions, buses will adhere to bus schedules posted on the Prairie Spirit website.

Students should stand back from the bus when it is approaching the bus stop and sit facing forward when the bus is in motion. If a student has to cross the road when leaving the bus, they must cross in front of the bus.

High school students may board or disembark at any stop on their bus route. Elementary and middle school students will only be allowed to board or disembark at their designated stop unless they have a note from their parent indicating otherwise.

Expectations

We expect excellent behavior and cooperation from students on our buses, just as we do in our classrooms.

A student who fails to abide by the rules, or who misbehaves on a bus, may be denied bus transportation. As well, inappropriate language will not be tolerated. After consulting with the bus driver, the principal may suspend a student from riding the bus for up to three days per incident. In the event that the principal recommends a suspension exceeding three days, the Director of Education, or designate, will decide on appropriate action to be taken in accordance with *Administrative Policy No. 409 – Student Discipline*.

We encourage parents to have strong communication with their bus driver. Please ensure your bus driver has all necessary contact information and is aware of any health concerns your child may have. Any updated information needs to be provided to the school, the Prairie Spirit Bus Garage and your driver.

At their discretion, a bus driver may ask the parent/caregiver of a Pre-Kindergarten student (under 4 1/2 years of age) to buckle their student into the car seat on the bus at pick-up and unbuckle the student at drop off. They may ask the school staff to buckle/unbuckle the Pre-K student at the school.

Bus drivers may choose to maintain an established seating arrangement throughout the school year. Drivers have the right to refuse transportation to any student who is not appropriately dressed for the weather conditions.

Severe weather conditions

Notification of bus cancellations will be posted on the Prairie Spirit [website](#) by 7 a.m. each morning. Please remember to refresh your computer for the most up-to-date information. Bus cancellations are also available on a Prairie Spirit hotline (306-683-2805). Phone calls will not be made for bus cancellations.

Buses will not run if the combined temperature and wind chill factor is -40 degrees C or below at 6 a.m. Buses for students with special needs are not to operate if the combined factors result in a reading of -35 degrees C or below.

Urban bus cancellations will be posted on the Prairie Spirit website

In determining if buses will run, Environment Canada's Saskatoon temperatures are used as a guide for Warman and Martensville. Please use the Environment Canada [website](#) to check the temperature posted at 6 a.m.


In stormy conditions (ice or fog), bus drivers within the same district are to contact one another and compare local weather and road conditions and use their discretion whether or not to run. Bus drivers are to decide whether or not to run by no later than 30 minutes before the first scheduled morning pick-up, and no later than one hour prior to the scheduled afternoon dismissal.

Buses that do not run at the regular time in the morning will not run at all on that day.

Schools will only be closed to students for reasons such as health and safety. As long as a school remains open for students, parents are welcome to transport their children to the school at any time during the school day.

Student safety

Children need to be aware that every yellow school bus is surrounded by a danger zone. There is a greater potential for injury in this danger zone than inside the bus. Parents should accompany young children to and from the bus until they are old enough to do this safely on their own.



Students should:

- take five giant steps as soon as they leave the bus
- establish eye contact with the driver when crossing in front of the bus and proceed only when the driver nods approval
- wear appropriate clothing for weather conditions
- sit properly, facing forward when the bus is in motion
- keep aisles clear of objects at all times

Students should not:

- go back to pick up items they've dropped near the bus

Stop Arm Violations

All Prairie Spirit school buses are required to use their stop arm and flashing lights when loading and unloading. According to the law, motorists from any direction approaching a bus with stop arm and flashers deployed are required to stop and wait until the stop arm and lights are cancelled before proceeding. Bus drivers will be reporting stop arm violations to the RCMP.

Some common questions

Q: Can my child be dropped off somewhere other than the normal place?

A: High school students may board or disembark at any stop on their bus route. Elementary and middle school students will only be allowed to board and/or disembark at their designated stop unless they have a note from their parent indicating otherwise.

Q: My child is having a party after school. Can friends travel to our home on the same bus?

A: No. The Warman and Martensville buses are potentially full, according to our registered student lists.

Q: Why is my child not allowed to eat on the bus?

A: Our concerns include the danger of choking, triggering an anaphylactic reaction among riders and spilling food or drinks. Students are only permitted to drink water on the school bus (not juice or pop). We need cooperation from parents in this matter.

Bus fleet

Prairie Spirit has its own bus shop facility on the east side of Saskatoon. This facility is an ultra modern five bay shop with all the appropriate equipment needed to properly maintain and service a fleet of 180 buses.

We have five highly qualified technicians who are experts in school bus maintenance. We are able to provide excellent bus service with safe equipment at a reduced cost to our ratepayers. Operating our own fleet of buses and using our own drivers has helped us to lower costs for charters and field trips, a very important consideration for managing school-based budgets.
