We count on this fundraiser to sup-

Fundscrip costs you nothing! By purchasing gift cards from FundScrip you can pay for everyday purchases that you already make. All you have to do is pay for some or all of your purchases using gift cards bought at face value from Fund-Scrip participating retailers and a percentage of every gift card purchased is contributed back to WCMS. The program has over one hundred and seventy participating retailers, including popular local businesses like Extra Foods, A&W, Boston Pizza, Pizza Hut, Subway, and Canadian Tire.

#### WARMAN COMMUNITY LIBRARY

We are excited to kick off another school year in the Warman Community Library as students can take advantage of a wide variety of services and opportunities far beyond what any regular school library can provide, including:

- Extended library hours on eve-• nings, weekends, and school breaks.
- Access to resources from across Saskatchewan's public library system.
- Online books and magazines that can be downloaded from anywhere to the student's device.
- A modern and comfortable space

Students must present their Wheatland library card to take out resources at any times outside of school hours.

As users of the Warman Community Library, all student patrons are responsible for adhering to Wheatland Regional Library policies regarding overdue and lost materials. Students are issued a receipt with every resource they check out of the Warman Community Library. Checking on the status of an account can be conveniently done by visiting the library directly, calling the Warman Community Library at 306-933-4387 or logging on to wheatland.sk.ca with the library card number. The pin number is defaulted to the last 4 digits of your phone number. WCMS students are charged fines in accordance with Wheatland Regional Libraries bor-

rowing policies for overdue and missing books. Please check your child's account regularly to ensure they are returning books on time. You should receive emails from the library when your child's requested books come in or when their books are approaching the due date or are overdue. If you have not been receiving these messages, please check with the library staff to ensure we have the correct email address on record.

In the event that settling fines may present a financial hardship to the family, parents are encouraged to contact Greg Tebay, WCMS Principal to explore other options including volunteering or service projects to address the fines.

#### **Re: Community Threat Assessment and Support Protocol (CTASP)**

Prairie Spirit School Division is committed to providing safe and caring learning environments in each of our schools.

As part of this commitment, Prairie Spirit works with other local school divisions and a variety of community organizations to put best safety and prevention procedures into place. This collaborative work, called the Community Threat Assessment and Support Protocol (CTASP), involves the entire community to support our safe schools and neighbourhoods.

As part of the protocol, we are committed to following established safety procedures in our schools. Our principals are required to complete a threat assessment to determine the immediacy and the level of risk whenever a student makes a significant threat to harm themselves or others. The purpose of the assessment is to determine how best to support high-risk students so that their behavior does not become hurtful or destructive.

The protocol facilitates sharing of information between community organizations (for example, the Ministries of Social Services, Education and Justice, as well as local police services and other organizations) when a student may pose a risk of violence towards themselves or others.

All of our principals and vice-principals, as well as many other school leaders, have benefited from training in this area called *Violence Threat Risk Assessment*. Because of our shared understanding and commitment to safety, we are well equipped to intervene and respond to a student in crisis.

We will continue to work with you and with our community partners to provide safe and caring schools for our students.

## **Control of Communicable Diseases**

Population and Public Health recommends the following measures to control the spread of disease:

- Hand hygiene, cough etiquette, staying home when ill.
- Children who have signs of illness such as fever, vomiting, diarrhea or rashes should not attend school until they are well and/or have been treated by a doctor.
- Children with the following diseases must be treated **before** returning to school:
  - eye infections
  - impetigo
  - ringworm
  - scabies
  - scarlet fever
  - strep throat

- Children with the following diseases may not return to school until parents call Disease Control at 306-655-4612 to discuss a return date:
  - measles
  - mumps
  - rubella
- Children with chickenpox may return to school when they are feeling well.
- Children with pertussis may return to school when they feel well enough to do so. Children will be excluded for 5 days after they start medication or 21 days from onset of coughing attacks only when there is a staff person (in the same classroom as the case), who is in the last 3 months of pregnancy.
- Schools are required to report any person diagnosed with pertussis, measles, mumps, rubella to Population and Public Health by calling 306-655-4612.
