Hello from Grade 1Kornelson!

What a wonderful taste of spring we had a few weeks ago...and now Mother Nature has dipped us back into winter for a little longer. Our class is fortunate enough to have had a little summer all winter long with our indoor garden. We planted seeds way back in October and now we are able to eat the fruits of our labour. We have already enjoyed tasting beans and peas. The tomatoes are just beginning to ripen and the peppers have many blossoms on them. There are no bumblebees in the room (thank goodness), so it falls to the students to pretend to be bees and to gently pollinate the flowers. They have been doing a great job! The growth the students are showing in their academics is amazing. Grade One students begin with learning letters and letter sounds and now they are writing stories. Wow! Next in our reading we will tackle nonfiction books about animals and they will try writing a nonfiction animal report. Grade One students start the year learning their numbers to ten, and now they can do adding and subtracting - another amazing set of skills they have learned! It is such a joy to watch the children grow and become independent. At the end of the month we will present our robots to Kindergarten and other Grade One classrooms. This has become a wonderful tradition here at WES. The students are delighted with their creations and very proud to explain the materials and fasteners they used to construct the robot. Thank you to all the families who are working hard collecting recycling materials and who are helping their children put the robot together. We are all looking forward to seeing the finished result!



If you were to spend a day in our classroom, you'd find that there are lots of interesting things happening! We are excited to be working on handwriting, multiplication and magnetism. Did you know that the earth has a magnetic shield, called the magnetosphere that protects us from solar storms? It's fascinating to know how invisible forces impact our lives! We have been intrigued by the book, "The Mysteries of Harris Burdick", and we'd describe it as "weird", "creepy", "fictional", and "mysterious". You should check it out if you get the chance! We finished up a fable-writing project just before the break, where our goal was to create a story that had a moral inferred at the end. We're also in the midst of writing to our Pen Pal's at Ecole Victoria School in Saskatoon. It's fun getting to connect with boys and girls our age who live in a different community! Speaking of connecting with other classes, we are having a blast working on different art pieces with the grade 2s in Ms. Leslie's room! From time to time we get to learn about celebrations that happen in other parts of the world. So far we've learned about Diwali, Dia de los Muertos, Chinese New Year, the tradition of Ukrainian Pysanky, and this Friday we'll get to experience a Quebecois tradition called "sugar on snow". We are ecstatic to try authentic maple syrup from Quebec and to learn about "sugaring off parties"! It's been an awesome year so far in 3L, and we can't wait to see what's in store for the last two and a half months.
